What does the future hold?

§  
Average salary increase of 4% and an average  
benefit increase of 10%.

§  
Additional cost EACH year: \$1.4 Million

§  
Problem: Revenue  
increases will not be sufficient to cover additional expenses.

Operating Budget (millions)

We have 3 choices

1) Seek a tax levy increase

§  
We promised the public in 2001 that the tax levy  
would last at least 5 years

2) Freeze salaries and benefits

§  
Contrary to goal of making wages competitive

3) Reduce Expenditures

Committee Findings

n  
District  
enrollment has decreased significantly, 774 students over the last eleven  
years.

n  
District  
enrollment over the last two year has decreased by 400 students.

n  
Kindergarten

---

enrollment has decreased the last four years by 99 students.

n  
Delmar-Harvard  
enrollment has declined since 1994 by 164 students.

n  
Flynn Park's  
enrollment had remained stable until this current school year.

The 2004-2005 enrollment has decreased by 45 students. The decline could be a result of the loss of students from the University Commons area.

n  
Jackson Park has  
had a minimal decrease since 2000.

#### Committee Findings

n  
Nathaniel  
Hawthorne enrollment increased this year by three students but still far below the 360 students that were enrolled for several years.

n  
Since 2000,  
Pershing enrollment has decreased by 118 students.

n  
The enrollment  
decline has existed over a decade and there is no compelling evidence to anticipate an increase in enrollment over the next several years.

#### Committee Findings

n  
The City of  
University has no projects on the drawing board that could result in an influx of residents with school age children.

n  
Current projects  
affecting the housing market are high end.
